Hello,

Thank you so much for your website. My family has never really known with whom my uncle (**Vernon E Carroll**) fought during the war. I did some research over the weekend with a photo of my uncle's unit, his silver jump wings and a few loose stories handed down over the last 60 years. Thanks to your website, I have been able to track him down and confirm some of my hunches. He was with A Battery, 460th PFAB.

My uncle refused to talk about his experiences in the war. It affected him greatly. Sadly he passed away in 1986 and I just wasn't old enough yet to have an interest in what he did for our country and my freedom.

I noticed on your website that you are in contact still with some of the members of the 517th. I'm not sure if anyone remembers my uncle, but I would appreciate any information that anyone might have regarding my uncle's experiences. What he may have been like on the battlefield and did he show any signs during the war of being so impacted by what he must have witnessed.

He did tell my mom that he had to hide in a barn for up to two weeks because he got separated from his unit. That is the extent of the story and pretty much all he said.

Hi David,

Thank you for your note. I will include it in the next 517th newsletter this week. There are only a few men left from A Battery that we have managed keep in touch with, but I will let you know if I get any responses.

I expect that when he was separated from his unit was probably during Operation Dragoon, when they parachuted into southern France but were dropped many miles from the intended drop zones.

I have not found a specific record of Vernon Carroll in my very incomplete records, other than his listing in the Christmas 1944 roster: http://517prct.org/documents/xmas1944/xmas_1944_battery_a.jpg
But there are several books that tell the story of the 517th/460th/596th (not to mention a fictional movie with 460th, starring Frank Sinatra). Here is one short history of the 460th PFAB to start:

I occasionally get a copy of the newsletter "Baseball in Wartime" by Gary Bedingfield. In the current issue, he highlights Major League ballplayers who served in ETO during WW2. Included in that list is Merv Connors of the 517th. **Pvt. Mervin J. "Merv" Connors** was in HQ Company, 1st Battalion.

Merv Connors (Chicago White Sox)


Connors served as a private with the 517th Parachute Regimental Combat Team and saw action during the Battle of the Bulge, receiving a Bronze Arrowhead for participating in an airborne combat assault. Following the German surrender, he played first base with the 13th Airborne Division Black Cats during 1945 and provided the offensive punch behind the pitching of Dave Koslo that led the team to a remarkable 33-4 record.

PS: According www.BaseballRefernce.com Merv played for the White Sox in 1937 and 1938. In 1938 he played in 24 games, hit 6 Home Runs and batted .355. He got paid \$2400 that year.



"Merv Connors was a star of the minor leagues. From 1934 to 1953, he played eighteen seasons and over 2100 games in the minor leagues. He appeared for 18 different clubs in 14 different leagues. He is one of three American players to hit 400 career home runs in the minors (Buzz Arlett had 432 and Nick Cullop 420). Connors finished his minor league career with 400 homers exactly and 1629 RBI.

In the majors, Connors hit 8 career home runs in 52 major league games. In 1938, he had a three-home run game for the Chicago White Sox. He has the fewest home runs of any player who had three in a single major league game. Rafael Palmeiro, in contrast, hit 569 HR without a three-homer game. "

“This is a story of passion between ordinary people and lovers of good local products ... This meeting took place on a sunny morning, high in the mountains of Menton. It is 10 o'clock, Ronan Kervarrec, chef of the famous restaurant Chevre d'Or, has arrived at the home of **Patricia and Roland Orengo**, owners of a small plot of land drinking in the sun. It is time to harvest. The Orengo family grows *crocus sativus*, a little violet flower, rare and fragile, which produces red gold: Saffron.

Flowering crocus lasts only a month, from October 15 to November 15. With its 2,200 bulbs, production is not huge but of high quality. In the end, only 70 to 80 grams of this precious treasure will be harvested this year.”

Épice Rencontre entre Ronan Kervarrec, chef deux étoiles, et la famille Orengo. Patricia et Roland produisent du safran, l'or rouge de Sospel, sur les hauteurs des Alpes-Maritimes

C'est une histoire de passion entre des gens simples et amoureux des bons produits locaux... Rendez-vous a été pris par un petit matin ensoleillé. Direction la campagne du haut pays mentonnais. Il est 10 heures. Ronan Kervarrec, chef du célèbre hôtel-restaurant de la *Chevre d'Or*, à Èze, arrive chez Patricia et Roland Orengo propriétaire d'une petite parcelle de terre gorgée de soleil. C'est l'heure de la récolte. La famille Orengo cultive le *crocus sativus*. Une petite fleur violette, rare et fragile, qui produit l'or rouge. Le safran. La floraison du crocus ne dure qu'un mois, du 15 octobre au 15 novembre. Avec ses 2 200 bulbes, la production n'est pas énorme mais de grande qualité. Au final, ce sont 70 à 80 grammes de ce précieux trésor qui seront récoltés cette année.

- C'est en 2009 que l'idée est venue de planter du safran sur nos terres. Un pari un peu fou mais qui va s'avérer payant. De la patience, du savoir-faire et beaucoup de soins apportés à cette petite fleur ont donné des résultats très encourageants. Et tous les quatre ans, il faut tout arracher et replanter », raconte Patricia. Après le ramassage, les fleurs sont émondées. On retire le pistil pour le faire sécher au four. Les opérations sont manuelles. Les

pistils sont conservés dans des bocaux de verre. - C'est en passant au *Mirazur* que j'ai découvert ce fameux safran, explique Ronan. La qualité du produit m'a tout de suite enchanté ». Les premiers tests seront réalisés avec de la poutargue... Le mariage est réussi ! Depuis, le pistil est tout l'année à la carte du restaurant avec une autre recette. La polenta au safran. - Un délice dont mes clients raffolent ». Tout est dit pour cette fleur d'exception ! Vous l'aurez compris, on ne plaisante pas avec le safran, mais on le partage dans l'assiette avec précision. D'une parcelle de terre, plantée en restanque sur les hauteurs de Sospel, à la cuisine du chef Ronan, cette fleur voyage à travers le temps, sans bruit, mais avec beaucoup de respect et d'amour. Une saveur inoubliable après dégustation !

God Bless him




20 juillet 1918 - 26 février 2010

MailCall List Readership and Cleanup

As some of you know, I switched MailCall over to a new and improved email sending service called "MailChimp" about a year ago. In addition to having better results in getting emails delivered without being rejected, I am also able to analyze the results of MailCall and see how many people are actually reading the MailCalls that are sent. FYI, on the average, of the 366 people who are currently subscribed to MailCall, only about half actually "open" the MailCall, although that sometimes means only that it was delivered to their email inbox. In most weeks, about a third (35%) of the subscribers actually click on the link and open the actual newsletter. That doesn't sound like much of a response rate, but that 35% is actually higher than the industry standard – only about 20% of people open most email list mailings. (I'm not sure which "industry" they are comparing us to, probably non-profit or alumni organizations. For business and retail emails, the Click rate is actually as low as 2-3%.)

I have recently found that I can also get some reports to analyze the readership in more detail, including a list of people who have never read (Clicked) any of the emails in the past year. Sadly (to me), there are 92 people who have never opened an actual MailCall in the past year. I suspect that rather than letting me know or unsubscribing, they either do not use that email address any more or the MailCall is automatically being sent into a junk or spam folder. Either way, they do not seem to miss it. Therefore I will probably drop them from the list shortly, and the resulting MailCall list will be down to 274 active MailCall subscribers. Most of the remaining (including you!) are fairly active readers and contributors.

Lessons learned:

- If you do not want to receive MailCall, just let me know so I can clean up the list. I won't feel bad.
- If you do want to continue to receive MailCall, you don't have to do anything.
- But... We would like to hear from you. Send us a quick note about yourself, your trooper, your family, your war stories and photos – Most of us still like to know and keep track of each other.

Thank you to all who have helped to remember the 517th, 596th, and 460th and FATF troopers.
