





Dear Mr. Thomas:

Thank you for taking time from your busy schedule in order to meet with me on such short notice on May 23, 1988. Also, please tell Mr. Rustin how much I appreciate his cooperation and assistance on the question of commemorative stamps for the U. S. airborne forces.

Your comments about the Citizen's Advisory Committee decision making process and the typical announcement schedule were most helpful. As I understand these procedures, it will be mid summer 1989 before your office releases the list of stamps approved for issuance in 1990.

You also reaffirmed previous reports that our earlier requests are under consideration by Mr. Faries' advisory group. Of course, this is encouraging news and will be reported through various airborne publications to our membership.

Please let me underscore two or three suggestions which I hope will be taken into consideration. First, there is a need to recognize the 50th anniversary of the airborne separate and apart from the events and personalities of WWII. Second, any such recognition should be limited to those troops that made up the original force - namely, paratroopers and glidermen. This does not preclude the appropriateness of future consideration of all elements of today's airborne assault units. Third, the broadest support would seem to favor commemorative stamps which depict the airborne in a generic manner rather than featuring a specific event or personality. And, lastly, it is our desire to work with the Postal Service in conjunction with the airborne celebration scheduled in Washington, D. C. during the month of July 1990. Some 50,000 potential stamp collectors are expected to attend those festivities.

I hope you will share this letter with Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank and Mr. Morison, Deputy of the Department. The latter gentleman is familiar with our cause and was most helpful to a delegation that visited he and Mr. Tisch approximately 18 months ago.

Finally, our files show an increasing volume of letters and verbal communications in support of not one but a series of airborne stamps and we will continue to encourage these men and women to express their desires to you and other authorities. Hopefully, the Citizen's Advisory Committee will honor us with a favorable decision. As you know, it is ironic to most of us that our own government has not been among the list of allied nations according such recognition to us and their own airborne forces.

Again, thank you for your time and attention to our concerns.


